She is currently working on a Master of Fine Arts through Massey University, after a First Class Honours in sculpture in a Bachelor of Fine Arts at Ilam School of Fine Arts in 2018.

Tui has worked at Pātaka since 2018 – as a technician, crate builder, in workshop maintenance, exhibition design and project management. Before joining us, she worked at the Christchurch Art Gallery, CoCA, Henry Trading, SBLA and at Te Papa.

In 2019 her artwork was at the Sumer gallery in Tauranga and The Physics Room in Christchurch. In 2020 she has had three solo exhibitions: 'Gentle Ribbing' at Toi Poneke, Wellington; 'Settle Petal' at the Corban Estate Arts Centre, Auckland; and 'Suck it up!' in the RM Gallery, Auckland.

GREG SWINBURNE WORKS IN GLASS

Greg is a Whanganui-based glass blower, regarded as New Zealand's foremost 'cold worker', working on cold glass using grinding, carving, engraving, polishing and other processes.

He completed a Diploma in Applied Arts at Northland Polytechnic before returning to Whanganui where he completed his Bachelor of Fine Arts at Whanganui Polytechnic, carrying on to study glass design.

Greg blows glass at either New Zealand glassworks or his own small furnace with the final cutting, grinding and polishing being done at his Lowther Street studio.

His work is influenced by Japanese art drawing from several forms including ikebana, gardens and calligraphy to achieve his sublime forms.
