Dowse Art Museum Friends to visit Pataka

On Wednesday 31 August at 2pm we are hosting a group of Friends from the Dowse Art Museum at Pataka. One of Pataka's current interns is Te Rauparaha, a direct descendent of the famous Maori chief will give them a guided tour of the museum. This will be followed by Pataka Director Ruben taking them around the *Here: From Kupe to Cook* exhibition. Friends are invited to join our guests for these tours and to share in some light refreshments and mix and mingle.

Friends were treated to a talk by Gregory O'Brien as he walked us through the photography exhibition *What I can see; Discovering New Zealand photography*. This exhibition that Gregory had curated was, in his opinion, some of New Zealand's finest ever photography.

He described the photography as being able to evoke emotions, to create magical moments. He loved the quirky, humorous, playful and sometimes mischievous images.

He showed us how photography can transform the ordinary into the extraordinary. How photos can be metaphoric and how photos "extract questions out of the enquiring mind."

Gregory spoke with great energy and enthusiasm. He ended his talk with a quote "the camera is a small room but big enough for both of us."

This talk was a real treat and for many of us who had already visited the exhibition, Gregory gave us a greater insight and appreciation of these exceptional photos.

National Library visit

On the 8th July a group of about 12 Friends met at Pataka prior to travelling in to the National Library of New Zealand.

Before boarding our bus, Te Waimatao, Pataka's Ngāti Toa cadet presented a brief history of Te Rauparaha's, (Ngāti Toa) journey south to our area with the aid of some of the displayed items and images in the *Whiti te Rā* exhibition space.



We were greeted at the library by Moana Ormsby , Anna Tiaki and Lynette Shum and were divided into two groups. One group visited the upstairs photographic room where the staff had old photos of Porirua and some of our more famous characters out on display for us and explained their provenance. The other group was taken to the room with the Certificate of Independence, Treaty of Waitangi and Suffrage petition live for a discussion about these treasures of Aotearoa. The groups then exchanged places.

We finished with morning tea provided by the library staff. This was a thoroughly enjoyable, educational visit and if you have never been to the National Library we recommend a visit.

What's on at Pataka

The Dawn Raids - Educate to Liberate. This exhibition is on until 18th August. Come and see the Bottle Creek Gallery transformed into a Pacific Island family's lounge from the 1970s. This nostalgic setting forms a backdrop for artworks, memorabilia, photographs and personal accounts of the Dawn Raids.

This was a time when Police and immigration officials entered the homes of Pacific Island people in the early hours of the morning, wanting proof of residency, work permits, and passports. The Polynesian Panthers, a political group that emerged during this time, fought against the unfair treatment, injustice, and oppression of Pacific Islanders and encouraged immigrant families across New Zealand to stand up for their human rights.

This powerful and insightful exhibition seeks to inform and educate about this period in New Zealand's history and honour the courageous role that the Polynesian Panthers played in the fight for social justice.

This exhibition was conceived by Pauline Smith and co curated with Ari Edgecombe of the Southland Art Gallery and Museum

A very important exhibition coming soon is *HERE: From Kupe to Cook* which will be available from 11 August - 24 November 2019.

Marking 250 years since the arrival of Captain James Cook and the crew of the Endeavour to Aotearoa New Zealand, *Here: Kupe to Cook* is an exhibition that dismantles misconceptions about the discovery of Aotearoa, beginning with the great Polynesian voyager Kupe, to better understand our connection to the people and places of Te Moananui-a-Kiwa, the Pacific Ocean.

Cathy Tuato'o Ross

Cathy Tuato'o Ross has an exhibition *Don't say it with flowers* which runs from 15 August to 15 September

Award winning artist Cathy Tuato'o Ross explores the idea that giving flowers is a communication avoidance tactic, in her new exhibition '*Don't say it with Flowers'*. "Talking to florists in Whangarei, one of the most common reasons men come in to buy bouquets is "to get out of the dog box." She says. Artwork titles such as "Something Like Love", "Guilty", and "Another Year" show a gentle satirical humour and give a clue to the real emotions behind the bouquet.

Cathy's art practice examines the relationships between people and objects and images. She exhibits nationally, teaches drawing and works as a freelance writer. Cathy was awarded the Merit award in the National Contemporary Art Award this year.
