Pātaka Staff member profile - Mark Hutchins-Pond

Many of our hard working staff are rarely seen by the public so we are profiling one of them each newsletter.



I studied at Elam Schools of Fine Arts, University of Auckland, graduating with a Batchelor of Fine Arts FA degree. I then taught secondary school art part-time and worked as a waiter at night, so I could paint a couple of days a week. I had some success as a landscape painter, mounted 4 solo exhibitions in Auckland dealer galleries and participated in many group shows. After doing this for 10 years I went back to the Elam to study art Theory, advanced studio practise and contemporary art history, graduating as a Master of Fine Arts with Honours in the late 1990s.

I then focussed on art curation and collection management so began studying for a postgraduate diploma in Museum Studies extramurally through Massey University. Practical internships were a major part of the course and I was fortunate to serve my internship within the Prints and Drawings collection at Te Papa the year after it opened. Although I thought the laborious processes of professional collection management rather tedious at the time, that internship proved to be an extremely useful and insightful experience in everything I did subsequently. Gallery/Museum sector jobs were fiercely completed for back then as they are now so once I finished my studies at Massey I worked several part-time jobs which included installing exhibitions for dealer galleries in Wellington. During this time, I also started working part-time assisting with sales at a small gallery that lead on to being offered a full-time position and eventually becoming the gallery manager. After 5 years at that gallery I decided to start my own business, opening Mark Hutchins Gallery in April 2004 on the first floor of 82 Willis Street, in central Wellington. After 3 very successful years I moved the gallery from its initial rented premises up the road to 216 Willis Street. When the 2008 stock market crash made seeling art very difficult I looked for another way to use my skills. In 2012 Darcy Nicholas offered me a temporary role at Pataka Art + Museum When Darcy retired in February the following year, Pātaka's senior contemporary art curator, Helen Kedgley, was appointed as Director. Darcy encouraged me to apply for Helen's previous role and I was fortunate enough to be appointed.

After a restructuring of Pātaka's management last year, I was appointed Curatorial team leader and manager of exhibition programming and delivery.

Rosemary O'Hara - terracotta cookware, domestic ware and Naked Rakau

Rosemary began her pottery journey in 1976 at Wellington Teachers College. She potted full time for 15 years in Upper Cuba Street and a few years ago picked up where she left off in her home studio in Plimmerton. Her work is inspired by folk art, traditional ways of pottery making, slow food and not least the beautiful taonga of our local birds and insects She hand builds and throws on the wheel, decorating her pieces individually.
